The National Information Exchange Model (NIEM) is a federal, state, local and tribal interagency initiative providing a national approach and common vocabulary for information exchanges.

NIEM is a program, built by the implementers for the implementers. It represents the hard work and dedication of many, working toward the goal of information sharing because it was and is the right thing to do.

NIEM provides a mature lifecycle that is a repeatable, reusable process.

Most recently, the Office of the National Coordinator has chosen to use NIEM to build and package functional specifications required for meaningful use of electronic health records.

NIEM was selected for Recovery.gov reporting based on feedback from state and local stakeholders.

NIEM conformance is now a requirement under some federal grants.

- **Paul Wormeli**
Mr. Paul Wormeli is Executive Director of the Integrated Justice Information Systems Institute, a non-profit corporation formed to help state and local governments

develop ways to share information among the disciplines engaged in law enforcement and the administration of justice. Mr. Wormeli was the first national project director of Project SEARCH, and was subsequently appointed by the President as Deputy Administrator of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) in the U.S. Department of Justice. He has been an advisor to the White House on security and privacy, participated in the drafting of Federal law on this topic, and responsible for the development of numerous state plans to implement the Federal and state laws on information system security and privacy. During his tenure in the Justice Department, he served on the President's Committee on Drug Enforcement. Mr. Wormeli is an author and lecturer on law enforcement and justice technology.

- **Justin Murphy**

Mr. Justin Murphy currently serves as the Senior Law Enforcement Advisor and Special Assistant to the Chief Information Officer of the US Department of Justice. As such he is responsible for being a liaison with Federal, State, Local and Tribal Law Enforcement partners on topics relating to the Office of the Chief Information Officer (OCIO). In that role, he provides insight and recommendations on the Department's Law Enforcement Information Sharing Plan and its adoption across Federal, State, Local and Tribal partners. This includes an in-depth understanding of such programs as the FBI's National Data Exchange (N-Dex), Sentinel, Next Generation Identification (NGI) and others. In addition, Mr. Murphy is the Deputy Executive Director for the National Information Exchange Model, a partnership between the US Department of Justice and the US Department of Homeland Security. The program is designed to develop, disseminate and support enterprise-wide information exchange standards and processes that can enable justifications to effectively share critical information.

Information Sharing Impediments

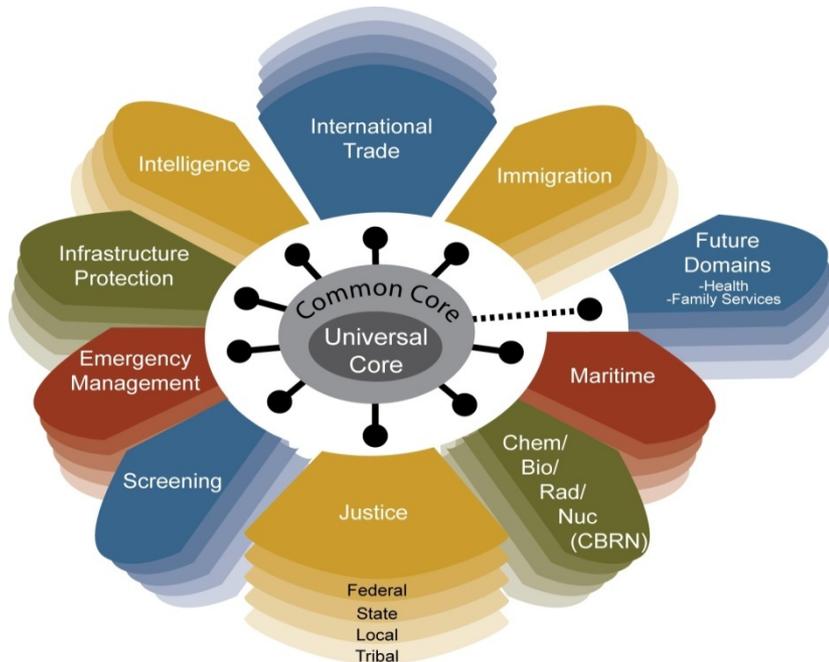


- **Access Barriers:** Legal, Privacy, and Policy protections associated with each type of data created, stored, maintained and shared in each agency.
- **Technology Barriers:** Network connectivity, system access, and an aging infrastructure.
- **Awareness Barriers:** We don't know what we don't know presents discovery barriers. An understanding of the data within an agency is a challenge.
- **Culture Barriers:** Differing cultures creates human barriers.
- **Language Barriers:** A standard set of terms and definitions for data that needs to be exchanged creates understanding barriers.

NIEM: A Common Language

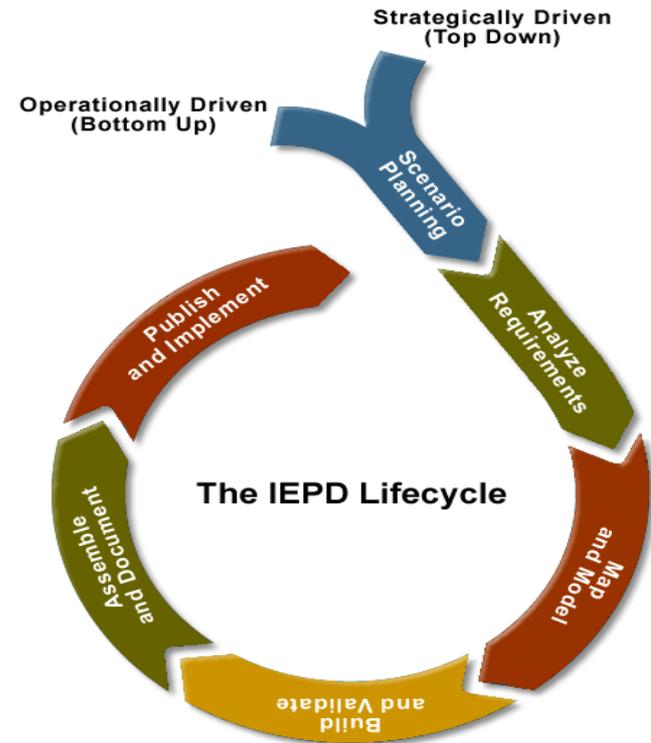


“Common Language” for Information Exchange

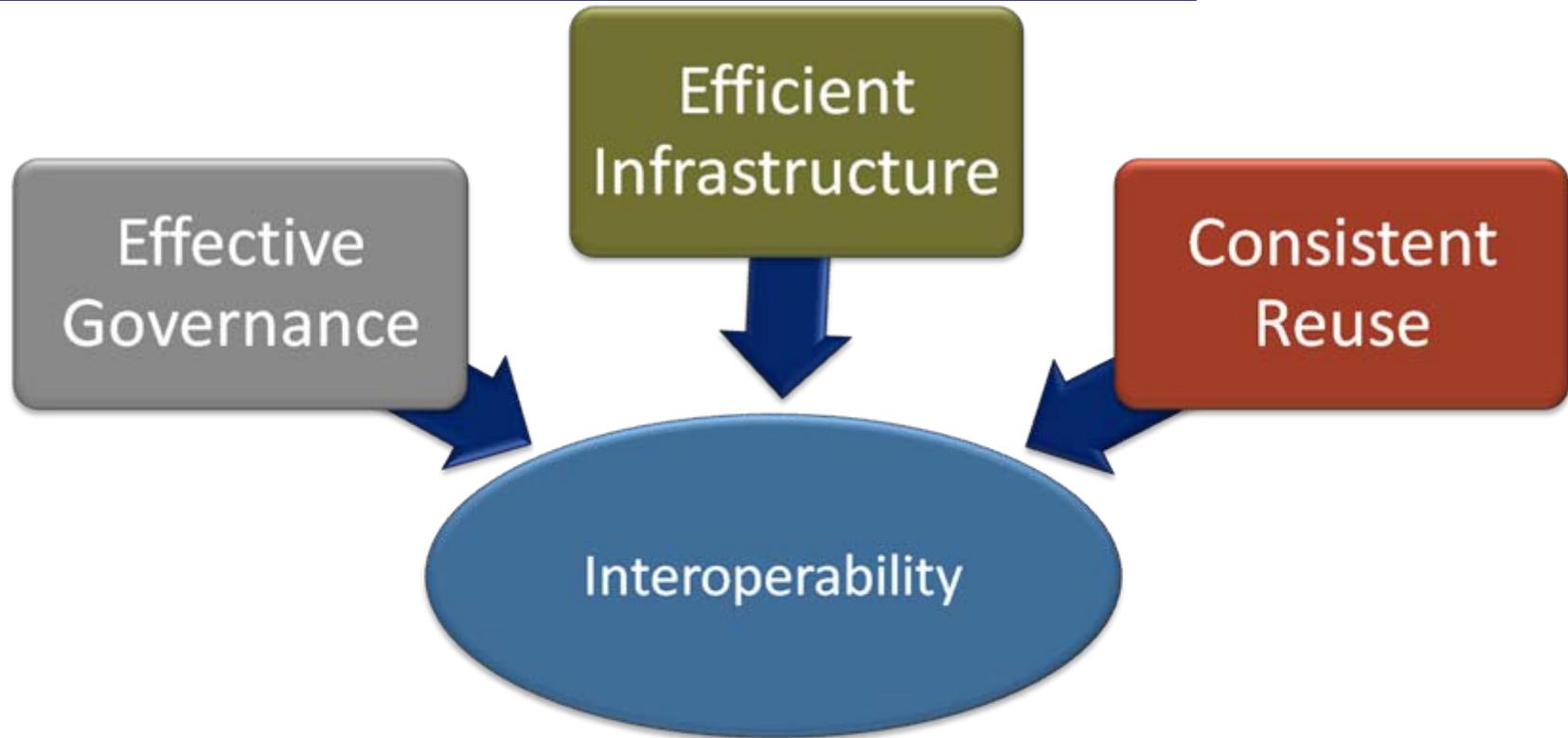


Built and governed by the business users at Federal, State, Local, Tribal and Private Sectors

A **Structured Approach** providing a repeatable, reusable process for business users to document information exchange requirements



NIEM: A Common Language



Interoperability is the ability of many diverse systems to work together. By increasing interoperability between mission areas and jurisdictions, government can enhance its services across key functional areas such as law enforcement and emergency response.

NIEM: A Common Language



NIEM Infrastructure

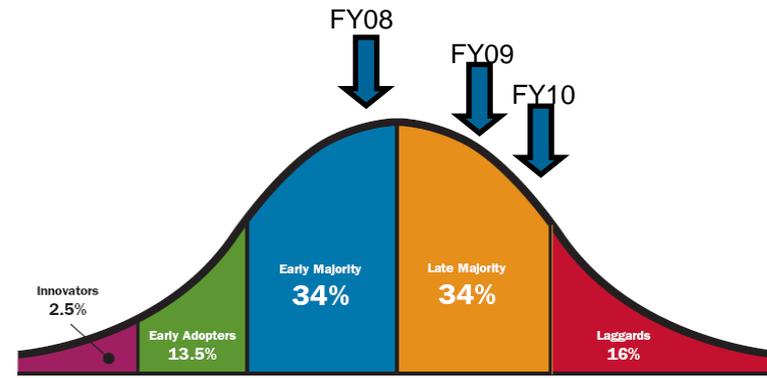
- NIEM has several mission based domains.
- The data elements within the domains are defined their respective Communities of Interest (COIs).
- Information relevant across domains is built into a NIEM Core.

Domain Governance

- Each domain has its own stewarding organization comprised of relevant stakeholders to manage updates and minor releases, e.g. NIEM 2.1.
- The NIEM Program Management Office (PMO) supports cross domain harmonization and maturation of the core for major releases.

Current Successes

- DHS adoption at 60% of Major IT programs for end of FY09
 - Focus on discrete reference Information Exchanges has increased adoption significantly
 - Measured compliance in investment review process
 - Built into Enterprise SOA Guidance and System Engineering Lifecycle
- DOJ adoption
 - Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS)
 - Terrorist Screening Center (TSC)
 - FBI's Guardian
 - National Data Exchange (NDEX) / One DOJ
 - Future Development of Next Generation Identification (NGI)
 - SAR – Suspicious Activity Reporting
 - LEXs Exchanges

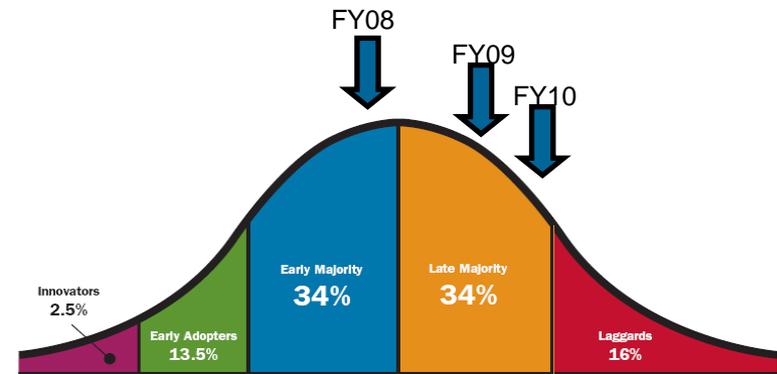


Currently, the adoption rate for DHS major IT programs is 35 percent, with a target of 60 percent at the end of fiscal year 2009. According to a recent FCW.com article, NIEM has reached its tipping point.

Adoption



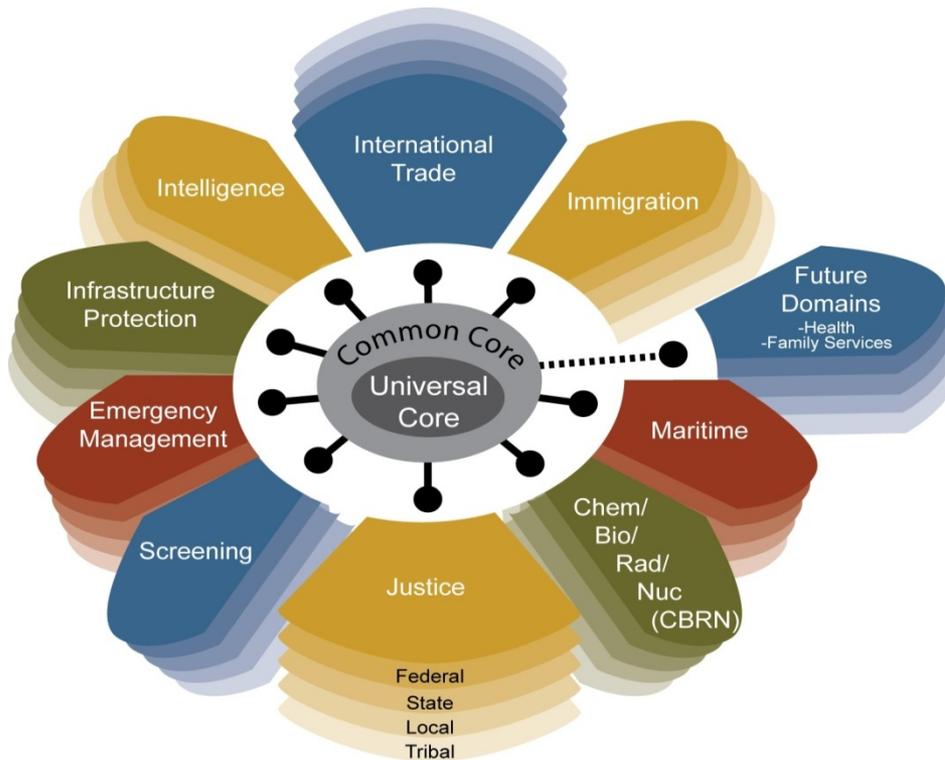
- DOD/DNI adoption through Maritime Domain Awareness and UCore 2.0
- HHS adoption through CIO and Office of the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology (ONC) efforts
- PM ISE adoption of the TSC Terrorist Watch List and Suspicious Activity Reporting Functional Standards which are NIEM conformant standards



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- State/Local/Tribal Adoption
 - American Recovery Reinvestment Act Reporting (Recovery.gov): Consistent guidance across Federal agencies to States, Localities, and Tribal communities
 - Colorado Integrated Criminal Justice Information System (CICJIS): Facilitates the sharing of criminal justice data among five state-level agencies at key decision points in the criminal justice process
 - Emergency Operation Center-Interconnectivity (EOC-i): Defined a set of data exchanges for requesting and responding to incident and resource information enacted and acquired during the incident (developed through interactions with state, regional, local, and tribal first responders in the Seattle and Cincinnati regions as well as in coordination with FEMA National Incident Management System (NIMS) multiple working groups)
 - 100% of States participating thru DOJ's NDEX

An Industry Perspective

- Reduced risk and cost of building information exchanges
- Improved success in meeting contract obligations
- Reduced communications problems
- Potential for reuse, replication of IEPD's, exchanges, web services
- Increased market for information sharing—IEPD's, exchanges, cross-domain information sharing
- Drives increased market for web services and SOA

- Industry has been involved from the beginning to help shape the model and harmonize the data content
- Representation on NBAC, NTAC, and NC&OC
- In the Justice domain, representation on XSTF
- Through the IJIS Institute, developing major reference IEPD's, help desk, coordinating training, technical assistance to state and local agencies, creating the IEPD clearinghouse

- Expanding domains for NIEM means expanded markets for IEPD and system development in Health, Family support, etc.
- Use of NIEM for federal reporting systems such as N-DEx and potentially health related systems creates new revenue opportunities (some grant funded)
- Step toward unrealized potential of e-government with attendant cost reduction and better service
- Interest in many states to expand to other domains
- NASCIO is actively promoting NIEM within state government and across NASCIO's corporate partners

- Support industry involvement in each active NIEM domain, particularly relative to SLG
- Create industry support groups, serve on domain committees, contribute IEPD's
- Provide services for IEPD development and exchange implementation
- Provide tools for faster development and implementation
- Support pilot projects reaching toward NIEM advancements

How to get started



1. Do some homework—read the executive summary and conops at niem.gov
2. Send developers and project managers to NIEM training
3. Volunteer to work on domain or national committees
4. Select a high priority exchange to pilot test
5. Define outcomes, success measures
6. Search the IEPD clearinghouse for reference exchanges
7. Draft an IEPD
8. Implement the exchanges
9. Document the results—share your IEPD's and experiences
10. Ask for technical assistance from the community

- Health – Health benefit access
- Cyber – Event notification and request for resources
- Financial Reporting – Recovery.gov and a possible relationship with XBRL US (eXtensible Business Reporting Language)

- *Include content to facilitate government cross-domain information exchange, including the ability to co-exist with standards, taxonomies or vocabularies already in use today.*
